

# Quarterly Report March 31, 2018

**Program Objective:** To ensure that children at risk for hip displacement receive appropriate screening and are referred to a paediatric orthopaedic surgeon at the appropriate time to minimize or prevent complications associated with hip dislocations.

### **Milestones since December 2017:**

#### **Clinical Milestones**

• Continued provincial recruitment with total of 686 children enrolled (32% of expected children with cerebral palsy born 2000-2016).

## **Knowledge Translation & Communication**

- Completed update and printed new Parent and Clinician booklets and Quick Guide poster with updated BC Consensus on Hip Surveillance.
- Scheduled presentations with BCCH Neurology and Radiology May 2018
- Accepted offer to present two scientific posters ("The First North American Hip Surveillance Program: Strategies for Successful Enrollment " & "Evaluation of Therapists Acceptance and Knowledge of a Provincial Hip Surveillance Program: Pre and Post Implementation Results") and two podium presentations ("The Effect of Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy on Hip Displacement in Children with Cerebral Palsy: A Long Term Follow Up Study " &"Inter-rater Reliability of the Identification of a 'Gothic Arch" in the Acetabulum of Children with Cerebral Palsy ") at the American Academy of Cerebral Palsy and Developmental Medicine Annual Meeting in October 2018 in Cincinnati, Ohio.

### **Data Management System & Evaluation**

- Near completion of Hip Surveillance Program Filemaker Pro database with one quarter of historical data entered to date; final corrections to build continue to be implemented.
- Completed detailed comparison of 2015 and 2017 therapist surveys.

#### **Province-wide Collaboration & Leadership**

- Continue to work with colleagues in Edmonton to develop a strategy to enroll and follow children receiving orthopaedic care at Glenrose Rehabilitation Hospital.
- Completed survey of pediatricians in the province re: knowledge of cerebral palsy; set for distribution through BC Pediatric Society and UBC Department of Pediatrics early April 2018.
- Developing a survey for parents/caregivers to learn about their experience in receiving a diagnosis of CP or other life changing diagnosis together with colleagues from neurology.
- Invited to participate on the planning committee for of the BC Pediatric Society Fall Conference that will focus on cerebral palsy.
